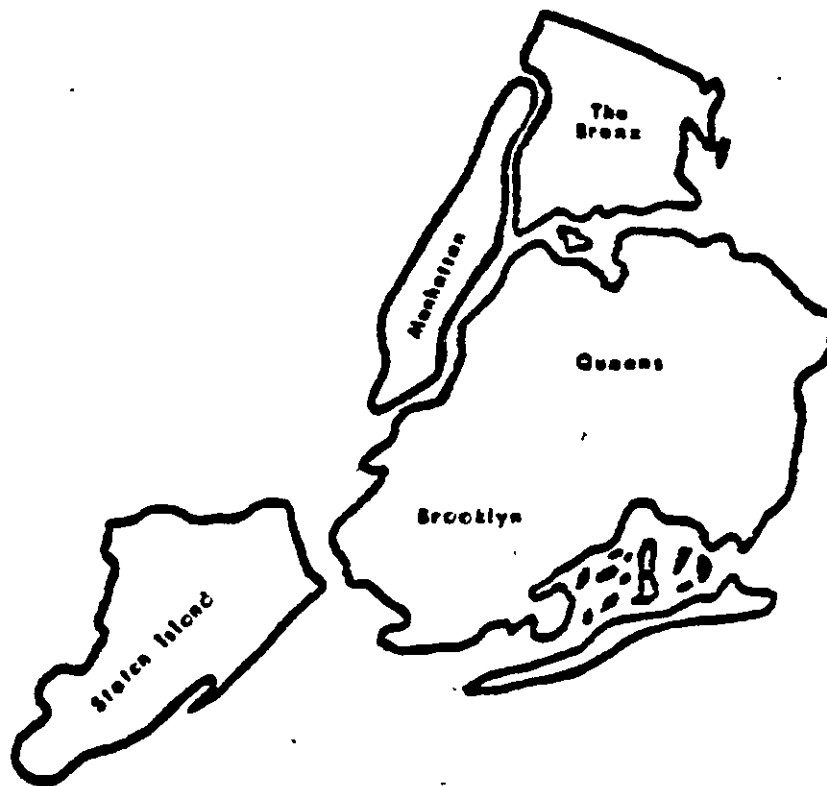

MINUTES

Salwen called the meeting to order at 8:00 P.M.

Secretary's Report

Amendments to the Minutes from the May 19, 1982 meeting, published in PANYC Newsletter No. 11 were offered. In the President's Report, the last line of the first paragraph should read "The NYU Office of the Provost expressed an interest in raising funds to put a faculty member in the museum." This related to the possibility of an archaeology repository at an extension of the Museum of the City of New York.

The Minutes from May 19 were accepted as amended.

Treasurer's Report

Sterud reported PANYC's balance at \$426.71, after \$16 in deposits and no disbursements.

President's Report

Salwen reported that as a result of Gorenstein's meeting with PANYC in May, Fullem invited a few selected archaeologists from the State to discuss SHPO issues. Salwen, Baugher-Perlin, and Vetter were among those who attended. Topics discussed included Fullem's sensitivity map; repositories; and burials.

Fullem showed the group his archaeological sensitivity map for New York State. Areas determined "sensitive" were those within a one mile diameter of recorded sites. If a new project falls within a circled area, a survey is required by the SHPO office. Fullem explained that this map complied with State Environmental Quality Act requirements. When questioned about the Federal Preservation Planning Process, Fullem did not express interest in organizing a State Plan effort with input from other professionals in New York.

Discussion about burials focussed on the problem of looting. The general concensus was that skeletal material should not be returned for reburial but would best serve as study collections.

Salwen reported that NYAC members expressed strong interest in historic preservation planning. NYAC members want to conduct a state synthesis similar to that conducted in New Jersey. Engebrecht set up a committee to organize this.

PANYC will host the next NYAC meeting on January 29, 1983. NYAC has invited Olga Chesler, Office of Cultural and Environmental Services, New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection, to speak at the meeting.

Salwen turned over responsibility for the 1983 PANYC Public Program to the new committee which includes Klein (chairperson), Naar, Sterud, Baugher-Perlin, and Bankoff. Though the Municipal Arts Society offered its facilities for the program, the membership agreed that PANYC should continue to hold its program at the Museum of the City of New York. Sterud informed the group that Holey, London Archaeologist,

will be in New York at about the time of the public program next year. The Municipal Arts Society will exhibit Hobley's museum material at that time and there will be a series of city-wide activities along the theme 'New York salutes Britain.' PANYC should try to coordinate with these events.

Salwen asked Baugher-Perlin to briefly discuss the City Planning Document which her office has produced for Manhattan. Baugher-Perlin described the document as a pilot study for developing a planning tool. Initially she tried to map out sensitive areas via maps with known site locations. She divided the historical period into time units and mapped key villages. She also mapped all streams and marshes to show areas of high potential for prehistoric sites. The document also addresses the question of correlation between building height, basement depth, and degree of disturbance. Anyone interested should write to Baugher-Perlin for a copy of Toward a Predictive Model: A Pilot Study, c/o Landmarks Preservation Commission, 20 Vesey Street, New York, New York.

Salwen urged PANYC members to comment on the pilot study. The archaeology community can offer support through input. Vetter reiterated that the document must be tied to the planning process. He stressed the need to test sensitivity judgements.

Salwen suggested that PANYC's Research and Planning Committee and other professionals meet with Baugher-Perlin and her staff in an atmosphere of give and take. Rothschild will serve as R & P Committee Chairperson and will arrange a meeting with Baugher-Perlin.

Winter noted that no matter how good a document is, it is necessary to contact the people who will use the document. Salwen suggested that Baugher-Perlin call the heads of city agencies together and give a presentation.

Committee Reports

Newsletter Committee

Marshall reported that she sent out a total of 48 issues of PANYC Newsletter No. 11. These included: 3 exchanges (NYAC, AIA, SCAA); 4 complimentary copies; 1 honorary member copy; 14 subscriptions; and issues to 26 members.

Action Committee

Geismar wrote a letter to Alanna Baerson, Executive Director of the City Planning Commission, informing her of the need to consider the archaeological potential of North Brother's Island prior to development. Geismar was directed to approach Terrance Moan, Division of Real Property, about this matter.

Baugher-Perlin reported that she met with Mary Ivey, NY DOT, regarding the Oak Point EIS. They agreed that there had been far more disturbance to the area than was noted in the EIS. Further clarification with regard to the archaeology will be required.

Research and Planning Committee

This committee had not met and had nothing to report.

Legislative Committee

Klein reported that the Army Corps interim final regulations for permits includes a category called a Nationwide Permit. The Nationwide Permit institutes an honor system. The regulations list conditions under which it is no longer necessary to request a permit. Klein pointed out that there is no way the Corps can check compliance with the regulations. PANYC members should comment on these permit regulations.

Orgel informed the Membership of new sets of regulations which affect agency relationships with the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation. These regulations state that only the state will review eligibility determinations. Federal agencies will now write Memoranda of Agreement. Salwen requested Orgel to keep PANYC's Action Committee informed about specific cases.

Salwen informed the group that the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Archaeology need comments.

Salwen attended a hearing regarding HR 132, the Shipwreck Bill. He reported that treasure divers attacked the bill while professional archaeologists supported it. The legislators now realize that there are people interested in protecting shipwrecks.

The Senate bill 1723, The Cultural Property Implementation Act, has come out of committee. Many opponents, including Senator Moynihan, have withdrawn their opposition in light of some changes in the bill. There is an air of optimism about the bill. PANYC members should again urge their Congressmen to support this bill.

Public Relations Committee

There was no official committee report.

Baughner-Perlin reported that SEQA people who visited the 175 Water Street site were very favorably impressed with Geismar's site tour and answers to questions.

New Business

Klein urged Landmarks to take action against people who have been recently excavating the Atlantic Avenue train tunnel. Salwen agreed to write a letter of protest for PANYC to the Bureau of Real Property.

Announcements

Geismar announced the dates of NYSAA meetings at Columbia University. Archaeology exhibits at Rutgers University, Newark, New Jersey and at the New York Historical Society were also announced. The Standard Chartered Bank, Park Avenue at 49th St., has a small display entitled Archaeology of Britain.

Old Business



Though informal, the format of this session is planned to be somewhat more structured than last year's. Some possibilities for discussion: the relationship of type and source of raw material to fluted point style variations and distribution in the Middle Atlantic; results of recent fluted point compilations and the implications for regional Paleoindian studies; origins of the fluted point tradition in the Middle Atlantic; the relationship of fluted point size and style to hunting techniques.

Session Title: Late Woodland Socio-Cultural Evolution in the Middle Atlantic:
A Search for Variety and Its Explanation

Description:

In the Middle Woodland Symposium at the 1982 MAAC, many papers suggested that there were numerous expressions of sedentism and/or ranked societies in the Middle Atlantic. The purpose of this session is to investigate the varied evolutionary processes that transformed these societies during the Late Woodland Period and produced the ethnic groups encountered at European Contact. It is hoped that the session will highlight the regional variety of Late Woodland societies in the Middle Atlantic, especially with regard to attributes such as degree of sedentism, socio-cultural complexity, agricultural food production systems, storage, and redistribution. Papers integrating prehistoric archeological data and ethnohistoric data are welcome. Regional syntheses focusing on the issues noted above will be preferred, although more general theoretical papers which seek to explain the observed variability may also be appropriate.

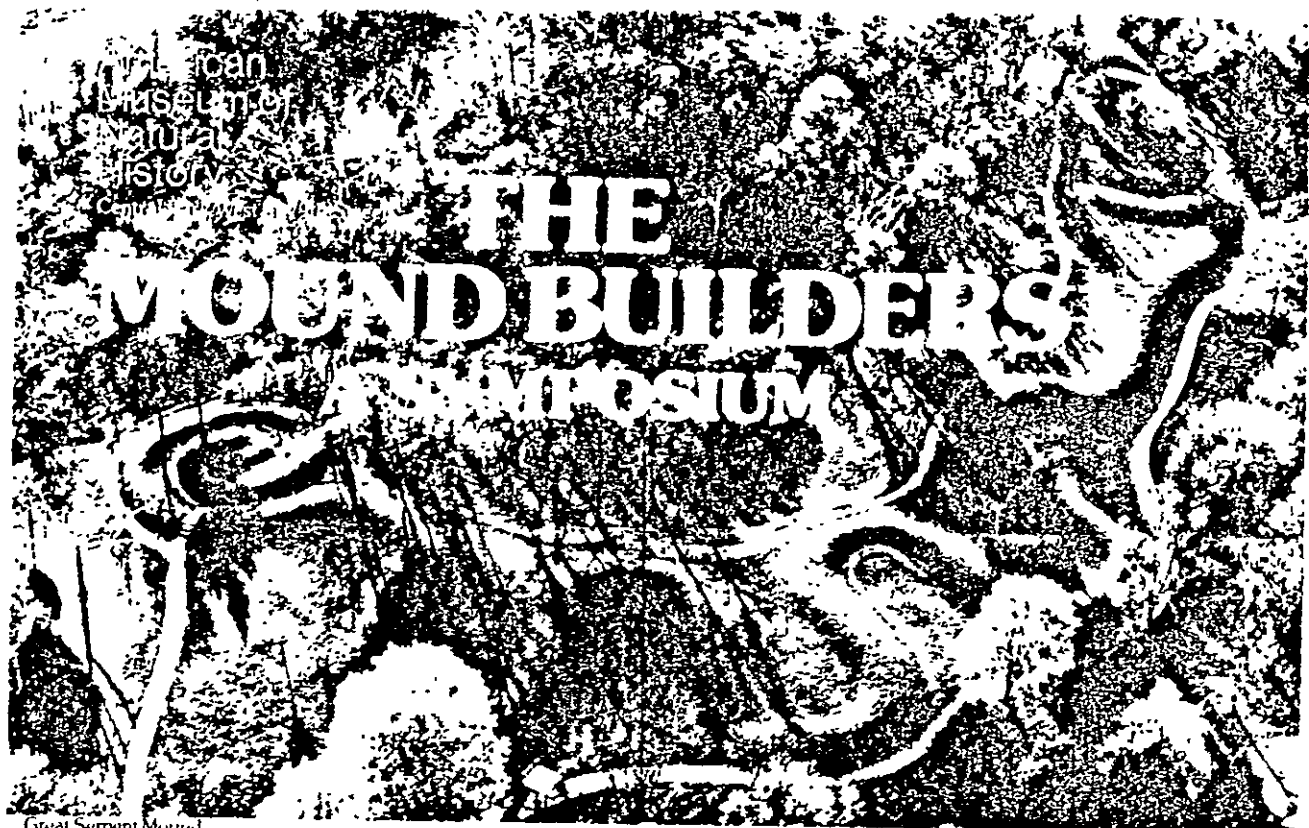
This general session in historic archeology seeks papers with topics which crosscut current archeological interests in the Middle Atlantic region. Suggested topics for consideration include:
